For the past six years, a select few from the Health Information Management (HIM) Department have been journeying across the world for the hands-on experience of working in a hospital setting. Two senior

students are selected each year as recipients of the Audrey Shaffer Endowment Award. They travel with Ms. Shaffer to Sir Run Run Shaw Hospital in Hangzhou, China and work in the Health Information department for two weeks during

their spring break. The students who were selected for the 2007 trip were Eric Morales and Patty Hartman. They traveled to China on March 18, 2007 and were introduced into the world of hospital health information management in an environment that is both challenging and rewarding.

While at the hospital, Morales and Hart-

everyday meaningful for her students and colleagues. She graduated from SAHP in 2005 with her bachelor's degree from the Health Information Management pro-


