It has been a very busy two years full of change. We have updated and upgraded many of our programs, and we've also added new programs. Our Associates Degree in Medical Radiography is now 21 months in length instead of 18. Beginning in the Fall of 2008, we are rolling in the CT program to the AS degree. Students will have the didactic coursework for CT along with a handful of competencies when they graduate from the AS degree. They can then complete their competencies on the job or with us by taking "Advanced Clinical." The Special Imaging program has been separated into two school certificates. Students can now take CT or MRI only, in six months each, or can still take both programs in nine months.

We have several online programs to enable busy professionals to continue their learning journey. We are currently in the process of taking the online Radiologist Assistant Programs (BS and BS Certificate) to the Master's level. If approved by the board in December and WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges) shortly thereafter, the MSRA will start accepting applicants in 2009.

It is proposed that there will be two tracks for entrance: 1) Join the program with an AS degree, and graduate with a BS and Masters at the end of three years, 2) Join the program with a BS and graduate with an MS in two years.

We also have an online Masters in Radiation Sciences (MSRS) that will begin in September of 2008. Our Bachelor's in Radiation Sciences (BSRS) went online this summer of 2008! Upon completion of the BSRS, students will also have a minor in Health Care Administration. Our last online program to mention is the school certificate in Imaging Informatics that will begin this fall. The program consists of 12 quarter units and enables the learner to function as a PACS Administrator.

With all of these programmatic changes there comes a pressing need for additional faculty and staff. As of July 1st, we have added two new full-time faculty members and two new contract faculty. We now have three RRAs teaching in the RA programs as contract instructors.

I'd like to take this opportunity to invite you to join us in two yearly activities. First, we look forward to seeing you at the next Alumni Homecoming weekend, April 16-18, 2009. We would like to do something special for the alumni of radiation sciences over this special weekend. Would you like to help us locate your former classmates so you can reconnect with them next spring? If so, please contact me at lalipoon@llu.edu and let me know which program you completed, what year you finished, and how to reach you.

Secondly, I'd like to invite you to join us on our continuing education cruises. In 2007 we went on a fantastic trip to Alaska, this summer we will be cruising to Mexico, the summer of 2009 will be a Caribbean cruise, and plans are in progress for the Greek Isles during the summer of 2010! The continuing education units are optional. So join us for some fun and bring the family along! I look forward to seeing you on the cruises and at the homecoming weekend.


cupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, dieticians, social workers, and chaplains.


