EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Loma Linda University, School of Allied Health Professions offers several programs that lead to Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) exam eligibility:

• The BS + MS program includes one year of graduate study after the completion of undergraduate courses. Graduates are eligible to sit for the RDN exam after completion of the graduate courses. NOTE: The bachelor's and Master's degrees will be awarded at the completion the three-year program.

• The MS (for bachelor graduates in non-nutrition areas/ international students) is a program for persons with a prior bachelor's degree. Students who have completed a bachelor's degree in a nutrition-related field at a nonACEND accredited program must apply for this degree route. Graduates are eligible to sit for the RDN exam after completion of the MS degree.

• The MS (post-Didactic Program in Dietetics) is for persons who have completed an ACEND-accredited DPD program. Graduates are eligible to sit for the RDN exam after completion of the MS degree.

EMPLOYMENT

Numerous opportunities are available for the Registered Dietitian Nutritionist. Dietitians in Medical Nutrition Therapy (MNT) assess patient's nutritional needs, develop personalized nutrition treatment programs, and evaluate and report results. Dietitians also work in public health clinics, home health agencies, major supermarkets, and food service facilities. Some dietitians oversee large-scale food production and service facilities in health care, college and university cafeterias, correctional facilities, and school food service Dietitians work under contract with extended health-care facilities or in their own private practice. Others work for wellness programs, sports teams, or other nutrition-related businesses. Some dietitians engage in research activities to enhance the profession. Increased interest in nutrition has led to opportunities in food manufacturing, advertising, and marketing, among others.

EARNINGS

Annual income at the entry-level varies by practice area. According to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics 2017 Compensation & Benefits Survey of the Dietetics Profession, Registered Dietitians in medical nutrition therapy may expect to earn \$65,000; in Food and Nutrition Management, \$78,000; in Education and Research, \$80,000; in Consultation and Business; \$68,000; in Community Nutrition, \$56,000.

The Department of Nutrition and Dietetics offers three options to complete a Master of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics.

Bachelor of Science plus Master of Science (BS+MS)

Entry occurs at the beginning of the third or junior year of college. To be eligible for admission, the applicant must have completed a minimum of 96 quarter/64 semester units at any regionally accredited community college, college or university, and earned a minimum of 3.0 GPA in both science and non-science prerequisite courses. The minimum requirements are:

ARTS & HUMANITIES (16 quarter units/ 11 semester units)

Select from at least three (3) subject areas

Art/ Music Appreciation Civilization/History Philosophy Foreign Language

Literature Religion American Sign Language

NATURAL SCIENCES

College Algebra, Pre-Calculus, or Calculus General Chemistry with Lab (one full year) Human Anatomy with Lab & Human Physiology with Lab Microbiology with Lab

SOCIAL SCIENCES

A Psychology course, a Sociology course, a Social Science elective (Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, or an additional Psychology or Sociology course)

COMMUNICATION

English Composition (complete sequence) Speech / Public Speaking

HEALTH & WELLNESS

Physical Education Activity (two courses) or military discharge papers (DD214) Human Nutrition

REQUIRED: Certificate of Completion of a Medical Terminology course

ELECTIVES: As needed to meet the minimum number of required units

Master of Science

Several options are offered.

1) MS (with prior BS/BA degree in non-nutrition areas/international students) - for persons with a bachelor's degree in a field other than nutrition. Students who have completed a bachelor's degree in a nutrition-related field at a non-ACEND accredited program must also apply for this degree route. The first year of the three-year MS is taught at the foundational (undergraduate) level. The second and third years are taught at the graduate level.

Prerequisites:

Bachelor's degree Graduate Record Exam (GRE) College Algebra, Pre-Calculus, or Calculus General Chemistry with Lab (one full year) Human Anatomy with Lab & Human Physiology with Lab Microbiology with Lab Human Nutrition Certificate of Completion of a Medical Terminology course **2) MS (post-Didactic Program in Dietetics)** - for persons who have completed an ACEND-accredited DPD program. Master of Science in Nutrition and Dietetics may be completed in two years.

Prerequisites:

Bachelor's degree Verification Statement from ACEND-accredited DPD program Graduate Record Exam (GRE) College Algebra, Pre-Calculus, or Calculus General Chemistry with Lab (one full year) Human Anatomy with Lab & Human Physiology with Lab Microbiology with Lab Human Nutrition Certificate of Completion of a Medical Terminology course

How to apply

We recommend that you apply soon after November 30. The deadline to submit applications is July 31. The application process is completed online at www.llu.edu. University catalogs may be viewed on our website. The outline of your plan for prerequisite completion must be indicated on the application. Prerequisite course work must be completed at any accredited community college, college, or university.

For international students

TOEFL or IELTS (or equivalent English language proficiency examination) scores for applicants whose native language is not English or whose secondary education was received outside the United States (refer to: https://alliedhealth.llu.edu/admissions/international-students)
