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Physician Assistant Students Take Class Trip to Mexico

It's important to get out into the community and experience what being a true Allied Health Professional is all about. This is why part of the new curriculum for the second year Physician Assistants (PAs) is to spend one week in Cuernavaca, Mexico at the Universidad Internacional for emersion courses in Spanish and some valuable practice time in the Clinica Vende with Mexican doctors.

From August 12 to 19 of 2007, 24 students, along with Dr. Ken Bourne, DrPH, MT (ACSP), PA-C, and Clara Ramirez, PhD Associate Professor in the School of Science and Technology, spent

six hours learning Spanish and three hours working in the clinic each day.

The University's Center for Linguistic Multicultural Studies has been the world leader in teaching Spanish for 50 years.

Since the student's mission was to move into the community and treat patients, the fact that 90% of patients spoke only Spanish made it imperative for them to learn the language. The small classes of five to seven people made it easier for them to pick up the language quickly.

PAs serve as the gatekeepers of modern medicine. They take the time to speak to patients, answer their questions and educate them about their medical treatments. In addition to this, Dr. Bourne says, "Our main emphasis is to serve humanity. These students must focus on becoming caring professionals along with learning the ways in which to give care in a compassionate way."

Dr. Bourne received positive verbal

feedback from those who went on the trip. The students stayed at the homes of local families and subsequently became part of their family for that week in terms of food, transportation and fellowship. They

also went on several field trips including the Ballet Forcloricco and the Myan Ruins.
